The TTD represents a suite of projects investigating factors that facilitate academic success and personal wellbeing in medical students. Over the next four years of your MD degree, you may be invited to participate by completing surveys, and/or volunteering for an interview or focus group to provide your opinion on topics related to the MD program, your well-being and the educational environment.

Your participation will always be voluntary and any data you provide will always be treated as confidential. All reporting of data will be in a strictly aggregate de-identified format so there is no possibility that any individual could be identified. Only trend data is reported in publications.

I hope you take advantage of opportunities to participate in projects that are of interest to you. Your participation will help us improve your educational experience and that of future MD students.
