UQGP Research

This practice-based research network enables GP practices and PCCU researchers to work together to develop and conduct practice-based research projects, building the evidence-base for primary health care.

Project updates

3-Domains toolkit for driving medical assessment in older drivers: Ten practices have finished using the toolkit in 50 older drivers during their annual driving medical assessment. Work is ongoing to interview older drivers, GPs and practice nurses to understand acceptability and utility of the toolkit in routine general practice.

Teaching in the time of COVID: This interview study is completed and under review for publication. Findings suggest GP teachers were keen to keep teaching in clinical practice during the disruptions of an evolving pandemic. Despite challenges teaching and learning some clinical skills, GPs identified new opportunities for learning including during Telehealth consultations.

RELEASE (REdressing Long-tErm Antidepressant uSE

in general practice) Think-aloud study with patients: This study is recruiting patients on long-term (>1year) antidepressants to explore their views on RELEASE resources developed to support people to safely taper and stop antidepressants when these drugs are no longer indicated. Recruitment: Exploring GPs' Perspectives about Using Single-Patient Trials (N-of-1 Trials) in Clinical Practice
