Identifying Information

John Citizen is a fourth-year student in the Doctor of Medicine (MD) program at The University of Queensland, School of Medicine, Brisbane, Queensland, Australia.

Unique Characteristics

John Citizen has provided the personal information detailed below.

John Citizen earned his Bachelor of Science in agroecology and his Bachelor of Science in general biology from the University of Toronto. John is the son of James Citizen, a cattle rancher, and Janine Citizen, a large animal veterinarian. John is one of three siblings. His older brother, Jacob, is a banker in Toronto. His younger brother, Julian, is a cattle rancher in London, Ontario.

At the age of three, John's brother Julian was involved in a farm machinery accident that severed three fingers on Julian's right hand. It was a traumatic experience for the entire family and John, aged six at the time, feared for his brother's life. After Julian was treated at Toronto Children's Hospital, John was in awe of the doctors who had cared for his little brother and it was then he first became interested in pursuing a career in medicine.

After completing university, John spent eight months learning to manage the day-to-day operations of his family's cattle ranch. This was personally important to him, as he was the fifth generation Citizen to work on the ranch. Although his brother Julian has now taken over management of the ranch, an understanding of the family business proved a valuable learning experience in managerial decision-making, multi-tasking, and time management which have helped him tremendously during his medical education.

During his biology degree, John spent a year as a volunteer at Toronto General Hospital. His primary duties involved distributing reading material, socializing with patients, assisting in

annual influenza vaccine clinics, and training new volunteers. He enjoyed this experience immensely as it helped him empathise with patients who have other thoughts and cares beyond their illness. During his second year of medical school, John volunteered as a peer tutor for first-year students. It helped him develop his teaching skills, in addition to reinforcing his knowledge of first year content.

In his spare time, John is an avid ice hockey goaltender, having once served as the practice goaltender for the Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League. He also enjoys downhill skiing, and holds Canadian Ski Instructor Alliance Level 1 certification. John loves learning to play new sports and in his time in Australia has played in the UQ Med Touch Rugby League and played on the UQ Med Australian Rules Football team. John is also fluent in French, having completed primary and secondary school in the Ontario French Immersion program.

Clinical Skills & Clinical Knowledge Examination

The Clinical Skills and Clinical Knowledge Examination tests clinical skills and knowledge from all rotations in Years 3 and 4. These examinations are administered at the end of the MD Year 4 and passing this examination is required for graduation. Students are allowed to substitute a passing score on the NAC OSCE for their Clinical Skills exam and the MCCEE for their Clinical Knowledge Exam. John Citizen is scheduled to complete the NAC OSCE and MCCEE examinations in order to apply for this exemption.
